March of the Newts runtime 4:09

Follow one of the forest's funkiest creatures into a gangly gathering of amphibious affection... and learn how you can help protect these sensitive animals from an emerging disease.



Alaska's Izembek National Wildlife Refuge and State Game Refuge lie along the Bering Sea coast of the Alaska Peninsula. They protect a coastal lagoon that holds the largest beds of eelgrass on earth, a magnet to migratory birds, making it one of the most important waterfowl staging and wintering sites in the U.S.

Experience Greenland through the eyes of Artist Zaria Forman, NASA scientist, John Sonntag and Inuit Elder Angaangaq Angakkorsuaq "Uncle." Zaria travels to Greenland for inspiration for her next body of work, and to visit the fjord where she spread her mother's ashes.

Selective breeding of the seven left in captivity means today there are 114 wolves back in the wild. One Health Productions heads to South Salem in New York to meet those responsible for saving this species.



In a small rural town in Pennsylvania, the refuge of a rare salamander and the only source of clean drinking water for 700 people is threatened by the installation of a fracking waste injection well, prompting community members to band together and mount an epic fight for the rights of their people and nature.

Feathers in Flight: The Bird **Genoscape Project**

Biologist Mary Whitfield has spent two decades studying one of North America's rarest birds: the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher. Populations have dwindled. Mary has joined a cutting-edge effort to gather data on birds' genomes from individual feathers, allowing researchers to connect breeding and wintering populations of the same species and provide critical information to save the flycatcher.



In 2013, Alaska proposed building a 225-mile industrial access road to ease construction of an open-copper pit mine near the village of Ambler. This would be the largest road construction project in Alaska since the Dalton Highway in 1974. We traveled 350 miles along the road corridor into the Brooks Range to ask what may be lost if the tundra is paved to Ambler.
